Suffolk will be in Tier 2: High alert from 2 December 2020

Government has announced as part of a relaxation of the current COVID-19 regulations that various areas of the country have been put into one of three tiers. Currently Suffolk has been put in Tier Two. This starts from 2 December and includes a range of things communities and businesses can do and not do:

The Government issued new restrictions which came into force from Thursday, 5 November

This new guidance meant some businesses had to close or others operate in other ways. The guidance can be found on the Government website:

On 31 October 2020 the Government announced funding for local authorities through the Additional Restrictions Grant, to enable them to support businesses in their local economies affected by COVID-19, in particular, those who are not eligible for grant funding under the Local Restrictions Support Grant. West Suffolk Council has now launched Phase one of its Additional Restrictions Grant scheme and the deadline for applications is 2 December.

 - As part of its national restriction measures to reduce the spread of COVID-19, the Government has announced grant funding to be paid out by councils to businesses that have, as a result, have been required by Government to close. These will be paid as one-off grants to cover a 28-day period from 5 November to 2 December 2020.

COVID-19 case numbers are rising rapidly across the whole of the UK and in other countries. We must act now to control the spread of the virus. The single most important action we can all take, in fighting coronavirus, is to stay at home, to protect the NHS and save lives.

3. Closing certain businesses and venues.
